Extended Study and Spiritual Renewal Leave (Sabbatical)

As our Moderator, **Mary Newcomb**, announced in worship on April 18, **Pastor Allen** will be taking sabbatical leave from May through July, 2011. A time of sabbatical was a part of Allen's call, and in fact is a benefit that many congregations offer their ordained staff. Several local churches have planned for and experienced a senior pastor's sabbatical. For some of us, it will be our first experience having a pastor on sabbatical.

Personnel and Council are working now to understand what both, Allen and the congregation, will need to allow renewal and growth during this time apart. All other committees, and eventually every member and friend of our church, will be involved in this process. Members of personnel and Council have met with Allen, have read or will read a book on sabbatical, and are reaching out to sister congregations in our area who are experienced in sabbatical to learn more about planning for, and learning from, this time.

Allen has chosen spiritual renewal as his focus. Through the year leading up to Allen's sabbatical, and during his sabbatical, all of us will have opportunities to focus on our own spiritual renewal.

Adult education about sabbatical is being planned, to answer questions and explain where we are in the process at this time. A sabbatical committee is being formed. As we learn more about the options, we, congregation and staff, will grow during this experience. We will provide updates.

A Message from Your Parish Nurse...

No one wants to find themselves in the situation in which they are dependant upon others for their daily activities. That is why it is so difficult to make the decision of whether or not, you or your loved on should give up driving. Please understand that getting older does not automatically turn one into a bad driver, however, sometimes physical limitations can make it more challenging. Stiffening in joints may make it more difficult to turn your head side-to-side to watch for on-coming traffic, to accelerate and brake. They can also make it uncomfortable for hands to grip the steering wheel. Reflexes are slower, and vision problems such as glaucoma, macular degeneration, or cataracts make it more difficult to respond to the glare of on-coming headlights, street lights, or bright sunlight, and sometimes limit peripheral vision.

Some of these age-related conditions can be compensated by carefully planning ahead: driving during the daytime; keeping to familiar streets; taking routes that avoid risky traffic spots, such as left turns and on-off ramps; not driving when stressed or tired; leaving at least two car lengths between your vehicle and the one in front;; and keeping headlights on at all times. Regardless of age, a safety belt should be worn and make sure to stay off the cell phone when behind the wheel! Consider taking a driving refresher course (contact AAA or AARP) – in fact, by doing so, you may receive a discount on your car insurance (depending on your carrier and policy).

But when should we hand over their keys? AARP (aarp.org/families/driver_safety) proposes the following warning signs as indicators that we should either limit, or stop driving either temporarily or permanently (one or more):

- *feeling uncomfortable and nervous or fearful while driving.
- *dents and scrapes on the car or on fences, mailboxes, garage doors, curbs, etc.
- *difficulty staying in the lane of traffic.
- getting lost – particularly in familiar areas.
- trouble paying attention to signals, road signs, cones and barrels, and pavement markings.
- slower response to unexpected situations (animals crossing, road construction, people walking/running)
- *medical conditions or medications that may affect safe driving (ex. untreated sleep apnea, diabetes, stroke)
- *difficulty judging gaps in traffic at intersections and on-off-ramps
- *drivers frequently honking at you

- *friends or relatives no longer willing to ride with you
- *difficulty seeing the sides of the road when looking ahead (peripheral vision)
- *easily distracted; hard time concentrating
- *hard time looking over shoulders while backing up or changing lanes
- *frequent traffic tickets or “warnings”; driving *
- *friends/loved ones expressing concern about our driving
- *frequent “near misses/close calls”

No one wants to surrender the freedom that comes with driving independence. However, we need to be realistic regarding our safety, and the safety of others when we get behind the wheel. It takes some planning, and some sacrifice on our part. Don’t wait; begin to explore other options now. Also, remember that if you need a ride to church, give the office a call and we will be happy to pick you up with the church van!

Religion & Race Lecture **May 12**

On Wednesday, May 12 at 7:30p.m., **Dr. Stephen Warner** will lecture on "Race an Religion in the American Republic". This will take place at Augustana College in the Science Building, Room 304. Dr. Warner's talk will stem from his current study of race and religion in the U.S. and Europe. "the U.S. has an open market for religion which is diffusely pro-religious, with increasingly broad boundaries", says Dr. Warner.
